A huge amount of Email comes from both Federal and State Headquarters and is automatically passed on to members with Email. I know that all Veterans are not on Email, but for the cost of a simple computer and a dialup Internet connection, you can keep in touch with what is going on in your neighbourhood, your state and our nation, plus what is happening overseas. Join the Information Technology world and keep informed.

Ongoing FREE computer lessons are provided by COIN Rockhampton with the basic class covering everything from plugging in, turning on and through to operating Windows, Internet and Email and now more advanced classes are also available. It was reported in The Morning Bulletin on the 9th Jan 2006 that one Jules Shelley, Vietnam Veteran had been attacked by a group of people. John Elson & I investigated the possibility of Jules being a Veteran on the basis that he may need welfare and pensions assistance. However, after checking official documents and speaking with his family it was determined that Jules was indeed NOT a Veteran nor had he served in any of the services. Under the Defence Act, 1903 as amended, it is a federal offence to

claim to be a returned soldier, sailor or airman, subject to six months' imprisonment and a fine of up to \$3300. Further it is an offence to wear a service decoration to which you are not entitled, attracting additional penalties. Jules provided a signed apology which was published in

The Morning Bulletin on the 21st Jan

The compiled case files on Jules Shelley have been sent to the Australia New Zealand Military Impostors net (previously the CPMH) just in case he re offends.

"AUSTRALIAN soldiers are being forced to buy their own combat gear because of sub-standard issued equipment." From the Courier Mail written by Lachlan Heywood on the 23rd Jan 2006.

High among the complaints were discomfort, chafing and restricted movement caused by the issued equipment. "Pack contains insufficient room to carry all equipment that is required to complete tasks. Also, pack is uncomfortable and causes skin to be rubbed off from mid to lower back," one complaint said.
